Deadline: Admission to graduate studies operates on a rolling basis; complete applications and their supporting documentation must reach departmental of ces on or bef ore the Date for Guaranteed Consideration speci ed by the department. To be considered for entrance fellowships, where available, applicants must verify the deadlines with individual departments. Meeting minimum admission standards does not guarantee admission.

A non-refundable fee of \$100 in Canadian fundaust accompany each application; otherwisite, cannot be submitted. This sum must be paid by credit card when submitting the online application form and is non-refundable. Candidates for **Spetiting**, and Qualifying status must apply and pay the application feevery year (i.e., very Fall term).

It is recommended that applicants submit a list of the titles of courses itakhe major subject, since transcripts offee gode numbers on Frankeripts written in a language other than English or French must be accompanied by a translation prepared by a licensed translator. An explanation of the grading system used by the applicant's versity is essentia. The applicant should also indicate the major subject area in which further study is desired.

#### Graduate Record Examination (GRE)

The Graduate Record Examination (GRE) (Educationeating Service, Princeton, NJ 08540) consists of a velatadvanced test in the candidates' specialty and a general test of their attainments increased basic f elds of knowledge for which no special preparation is required or recommended. It is offered at many centres, including Montreal, weral times a year; the entimeærination takes about eight hours, and there is gristeration fee. Refer to www.ets.og/gre for further information. Only some departments require applicants to write the xait frametion, but all applicants who have written either the general aptitude or the authored test are advised to ensure that off cial test results are sent to McGill directly by the testing service.

This credential is of special importance in the case of applicants whose education has been interrupted, or has not levadir gcalguate study in the subject selected. In such cases the department has the right to insist on a report from the Graduate Record Examination or some similar test. #### 6.5 Competency in English

Applicants to graduate studies must demonstrate an adequateflerof cience in Englishprior to admission, regardless of citizenship status or country of origin.

Normally, applicants meeting grone of the following conditions are ND required to submit proof of prof cientin English:

- 1. Mother tongue (language f rst learned and still used on a daily basis) is English.
- 2. Has obtained (or is about to obtain) an ugdaduate or graduategree from a recognized foreign institution where English is the language of instruction.
- 3. Has obtained (or is about to obtain) an ugdaduate or graduate gree from a recognized institution in Canada or the United Statement (anglophone or francophone).
- 4. Has lived and attended uneirsity, or been emploed, for at least four consecutivears, in a country where English is the ackledged primary language.

Applicants who do not meet yanof the above-listed conditions must demonstrate prof cyein English usingone of the following options:
