3.9 Quebec Inter-University Transfer Agreement: McGill Students

The Quebec Interdiniversity Transfer (IUT) agreement permits concurrengistration at McGill and another Quebec institution.

3.11 Courses Taken under the Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U) Option

The principle of the Satisactory/Unsatisactory (S/U) option is to encourage you to atakourses outside the area of your specialization with the offie enabling you to acquire knowledge and skills in askiety of elds.

Where permitted by acculty and program gelations, you may takone elective course per term to be graded under the Statistic/Unsatistictory (S/U) option, to a maximum of 10% of your credits taket McGill to full the degree requirements.

If you decide to have an electric course graded as Satisfory/Unsatisfactory (S/U), you must do so before the Course Change deadline on Minery (www.mcgill.ca/minery) as part of the Student Menu > Restration Menu > Quite Add or Drop Course Sections Ment/You cannot make any changes after the Course Change deadline wen if you selected the option by mistate. If the course is a multi-term course, you must select the S/U option by the Course Change deadline of the rst part of the course.

The instructor will report grades in the normal flion. Grades of through C are concreted to "Satisfactory" (S), and grades of D, and J are concreted to "Unsatisfactory" (U). The courses taken under the S/U option will be calculed from the grade point of grade (GP) calculations, but they will be included in the attempted credits total. Credits for courses with a nal grade of S will also be included in the number of credits earned.



Note: To be considered for in-course ards, including Dean's Honour List designations, and/or the entrance scholarships, you must complete at least 27 graded credits in the last academic session, not including courses completed under the S/U option.
