5.1 Master's Degrees

As a rule, no more than one-third of the McGill program formal course(not thesis, project, stage, or internship) can be credited with courses from another uniersity.

Non-thesis derees normally specify the course program which the candidate must follo

The candidate is required to pass, with a grade of B- or baltabout back to be be the back of the program, including additional requirements.

Students taking courses at another versity must obtain a minimum grade of B- (65%) if the course is to be credited their McGill degree. In the cases where only a letter grade is used, a B- is the minimum passing grade and and an experimentage will be considered. In the cases where only a percentage grade is used, 65% is the minimum passing grade.

8 Postdoctoral Research

Students must inform themsels/of University rules and gulations and keep abreast of girchanges that may occul he Postdoctoal Research section of this publication contains important details required by postdoctoral scholars during their studies at McGill and should be periodically consulted, along with other sections and related publications.

8.1 Postdocs

Postdocs are recent graduates with a Ph.D. ovælent (i.e., Medical Specialist Diploma) ægged by a member of the Uversity's academic stafincluding Adjunct Professors, to assist him/her in research.

Postdocs must be appointed by their department agristered with Enrolment Services in order to the access to University facilities (library computer etc.).

8.2 Guidelines and Policy for Academic Units on Postdoctoral Education

The general guidelines listed beviare meant to encourage units transition their policies and procedures to support postdoctoral educations. Exit hosting Postdocs should verse policies and procedures for the viprim of postdoctoral education as well as established means for informing Postdocs of policies, procedures, and viprimes (e.g., orientation sessions, handbooks, etc.), as well as mechanisms for addressing careful educations, units should ensure that their policies, procedures available are consistent with these guidelines and the Charter of Stu Rights'. For their part, Postdocs are responsible for informing them are by procedures, and viprimes.

1. De®nition and Status

i. Postdoctoral status will be recognized by the versity in accordance with Quebec version regulations. Persons may only bejustered with postdoctoral status for a period of up to version from the date the verse available of Ph.D. or equalent degree. Time allocated to parental or health leave is added to this period of time. Leave for other reasons, including out on the verse, do not stend the term. Postdocs must do research under the supervision of a McGill profession cluding Adjunct Professors, who is a member of McGill©s academine with the abilities to ful® responsibilities as a supervisor of the research and as a mentor for verse verse verse verse verse of the engged primarily in research with minimal teaching or other responsibilities.

2. Registration

i. Postdocs must beginstered annually with the Unersity through Enrolment Services. Initialgistration will require an original or notarized score the Ph.D. diploma. Restration will be limited to persons who ful® the de®nitionvalaand for whom there is an assurance of appropriate funding and where the unit can provide assurance of the necessary resources to permit postdoctoral education.

- ii. Upon registration, the Postdoc will be eligible for a Venisity identity card issued by Enrolment Services.

8.4 Leave of Absence for Health and Parental/Familial Reasons

A leave of absence may be granted for maternity or parental reasons or for health reasons (see the under University Regulations and Resource > Graduate> : Leave of Absence Status

Eligibility

General Conditions

Withdrawal fr om the M.B.A. Program

Students wishing to withdwafrom the McGill M.B.A. program must complete a *itMd* raval Form^o available from the M.B.A. of®ce. Students will not be considered as of®cially withdwa until this form is completed. Students who drop out of the programdchot complete this form will be billed for the full tuition. Grading and Promotion Standards

The pass grade for each course is B- (65%).

Failur es

Students are permitted oradifure in the M.B.A. programAny subsequentaflure, including an unsuccessful supplementation, will result in the student being askd to withdraw from the M.B.A. program.

Outside Elective Courses

An outside elective is any course that is not part of the M.B.A. progration includes courses in otherculties within McGill University or outside McGill University.

There are limitations to the number of courses an M.B.A. student caputatide the Desautelacfulty of Management during the M.B.A. program:

- 1. Students completing a 57-credit program may tak credits maximum outside the Desautelsuffy of ManagemenT.his does not include courses offered by otheraculties at McGill.
- 2. Students may not takcourses outside the Gulty if they are ofered within the Eculty unless there are comptional circumstances.
- 3. Students may not taklanguage courses for creditivated the M.B.A.

M.B.A. Part-Time Studies

Students will follow a lockstep program, which will allofor completion of the core courses during the ®rst year of. Studyents must then take number of cross-disciplinary courses and amperiential component to complete thegree.

A limit of ®ve years is permitted to complete the gree requirements.

Combined Full-Time and Part-Time Studies

There are two options by which students may combine full-time and part-time studies.

Option 1

Upon completion of the entire ®rst year of core courses on a part-time basis, students may request a status change to full-time to complete the remainin requirements as full-time students.

Option 2

Upon completion of the core requirements on a full-time basis, students may request a status change to part-time to completeetheirenents.
